- USDA-donated food purchases should be delivered on time

Breakfast Meal Pattern

- More fruit (starting 2014-15)
- Half of all grains offered must be whole grainrich
- Trans-fat is limited to 0 grams per serving
- Less sodium
- Calorie ranges are tailored to specific age/grade groups

All breakfast meal pattern changes fully implemented by **SY 2022-2023**



USDA Foods

New products to support the new meal requirements:

- Lower sodium string cheese
- Whole kernel corn and bulk frozen mushrooms
- Frozen broccoli florets and frozen chopped spinach
- Unsweetened applesauce



USDA Foods

New products to support the new meal requirements:

- More creditable portions meat/meat alternate available
- Lower sodium meat/meat alternates
- No added trans fats in USDA peanut & sunflower butter, vegetable oils, frozen potato products, & Catfish strips
- Frozen fruits can contain added sugars through June 30, 2015

Food and Nutrition in 2014-15

- Smart snacks in schools
- Universal breakfast
- Community eligibility option



A la carte, school store, snack bar, vending

- Schools/state rules may be stricter
- LEA shares responsibility
- TDA and ESCs ready to train

Meet at least one of these criteria:

- Be a whole grain rich product
- Have as the first ingredient a fruit, vegetable, dairy product or protein food (meat, beans, poultry, etc.)
- Be a combination food with at least a quarter cup fruit and/or vegetable
- Contain 10% of daily value of a nutrient of public health concern

Must meet **all** the following criteria:

- Sugar limits
- Fat limits
- Calorie limits
- Sodium limits

Some foods are exempt

Beverage requirements

- Water: non-carbonated or carbonated
- Milk: low-fat, nonfat, and nutritionally equivalent alternatives
- Juice: full strength or diluted with water fruit and vegetable
- Caffeine free: until high school
- Serving sizes: except water

Texas Public School Nutrition Policy

- TPSNP has kept Texas ahead of the curve with nutrition standards for competitive foods in schools
- Harmonization of regulation and rules
 - Streamline
 - Greater Efficiency
 - Greater Compliance

Universal Breakfast

SB 376: public school campuses and openenrollment charter schools with 80% or more of the students qualified for a free or reduced-price breakfast will be required to offer breakfast at no cost to all students beginning SY 2014-2015.

More than 60% of schools subject to SB 376 are already compliant.





Universal Breakfast

Waiver Process

- Campuses that meet the criteria but do not wish to provide universal breakfast must vote to opt out of the requirement at a board of trustees meeting
- Based on the voting outcome, schools may request a waiver from TDA



Universal Breakfast

Waiver Process

- This process must be followed annually;
 waivers granted will be valid for one year
- More than 1,000 schools are now required to offer no-cost breakfast or seek a waiver.

Community Eligibility

Benefits

- All students nourished at no charge
- No applications
 - Ease administrative burden
 - No application processing
 - No verification
 - Household advantages
 - No submission of applications
- Meal service simplified
 - No student eligibility to identify





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
